#### 57,301 students took part in the Writers in Schools visits in 2018.

Is it still possible to get a specific author from another region, especially if there are other schools keen to share the travel and accommodation expenses? Absolutely. It just needs one school to commit to a date and agree to underwrite our estimate of costs (in case we can't on-sell it for any reason) this estimate is usually between \$700 and \$800 plus GST). This year we were able to work like this with Southwell School in Hamilton who requested Gareth Ward; Kapanui School on the Kapiti Coast who requested James Russell; Rangikura School in Porirua who requested Pauline Vaeluaga Smith; Leithfield School in North Canterbury requested Melanie Drewery; Botany Downs School in Auckland requested Juliette MacIver; Marlborough Girls College requested Selina Tusitala Marsh; Bluestone School in Timaru requested Donovan Bixley. Bluestone have requested an author to tour every year since I've been in this role. They requested Glyn Harper in 2018 and Melanie Drewery in 2017.

And authors who are organising their own tours and for whom schools have been able to use the Book Council subsidy towards the cost of that visit include: Apirana Taylor, Des Hunt, Deano Yipadee, Jennifer Somervell, Brian Falkner.

Do you still do writers tours to get authors and illustrators beyond their local region? Yes. This year we took Chris Lam Sam to the West Coast with support from the West Coast Trust; David Hill to the #NZReadAloud schools in Napier with support from the Eastern & Central Trust; Daisy Lavea-Timo to Wellington with support from Pub Charities; and John Carr to South Taranaki with support from the South Taranaki District Libraries. Also, more and more regularly the authors are telling us when they'll be in an area and available for school visits. In this way this year we've been able to support school visits by Apirana Taylor, Des Hunt, Deano Yipadee, Jennifer Somervell, Brian Falkner, Maria Gill, Ella West, Fifi Colston, Vivienne Plumb, David Riley, Angie Belcher...



The purpose of the New Zealand Picture Book Collection, He Kohinga Pukapuka Pikitia o Aotearoa, is to provide a set of quality New Zealand English picture books reflecting diversity in New Zealand society which can be used in New Zealand classrooms with specially designed, curriculum-linked classroom activities.
